 noon, on Tuesday, August 4th. No exceptions.**

- 1) Entries, with the proper fees, must be submitted through your Wisconsin State Fair County Youth Participation Contact. Entries sent directly to Wisconsin State Fair will not be accepted. Entry forms must contain complete information for breeding animals including class number, birth date, tattoo, name and registration number. Any entries without proper information will be returned. See "Junior General Rules and Regulations" on www.wistatefair.com for eligibility requirements.
- 2) An exhibitor may enter up to 2 dairy animals with no more than one entered per class. The managerial project is limited to one animal per exhibitor.
- 3) Cattle will be shown by breed according to age class. No substitutions allowed with the exception of the county designated alternates.
- 4) Alternate Entries: There are no entry fees for alternates. Counties with a quota of 19 head or less will be allowed 5 alternate entries and counties with a quota of 20 head or over will be allowed 8 alternate entries. Each county may designate 2 of their allowed alternates as "county alternates" which may be exhibited by any of the exhibitors who have a State Fair dairy entry. "County Alternates" will be eligible to substitute for hardship cases only. A hardship case is defined as an entry not being able to show for animal health reasons. Hardship cases will require written verification from a veterinarian. Those who exhibit a hardship alternate are not eligible to enter in showmanship classes. County designated alternates are limited to calves and yearlings and will be considered a managerial animal. Managerial forms will not be required on these "county alternates. All remaining alternate entries must be entered in the name of a specific exhibitor and only that exhibitor is eligible to substitute for scratches.
- 5) Junior Dairy animals must be stalled with the County of entry.
- 6) Entry records must be checked-in by 6:00 pm, Wednesday.
- 7) Exhibitors must be capable of controlling their animal in the ring. Any exhibitor not capable of controlling his or her animal in the ring may be excused at the discretion of the Superintendent and/or the Judge.
- 8) Storage of hay or straw in the barns will be limited. Each county is required to provide a truck and/or trailer in which to store remaining feed and bedding. These vehicles will be assigned to a designated parking area.
- 9) All **owned** animals entered and shown in the Junior Show are eligible for exhibition in the open shows. Entries, including all fees, are due by June 16th on the appropriate entry forms. Late entries are subject to available barn space and must pay the late entry fee. See the "Open Dairy" section on www.wistatefair.com for Open Dairy Show rules and regulations.

DAIRY CATTLE QUOTA

- 1) The maximum number of dairy animals to be exhibited at the Wisconsin Junior State Fair by any County is set at 60 head, unless space is available after Counties with lower quotas fail to fill the space available.
- 2) Quotas allotted to Counties for 2009 will be based on 4 parameters:
 - a) Existing 3 year average of animals shown in 2006, 2007, 200870%
 - b) County ratio of State Fair exhibitors to quota.....10%
 - c) Number of county 4-H dairy project members between grades 6-1310%
 - d) Number of all registered Junior Dairy animals shown at each county fair.....10%
- 3) If space is available additional animals shall be allotted first to Counties who have more junior dairy members interested in showing at State Fair than quota to accommodate.
- 4) Any county that has not exhibited in any or all of the last 3 years is entitled to a maximum of 4 animals or the quota allotment calculation if higher.
- 5) It is suggested that animals selected for State Fair exhibition should be carefully selected by a County committee.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

- 1) **Ownership:** is established when the animal is registered in the name of the junior exhibitor. **Co-ownership is allowed between immediate junior family members (i.e. brother, sister).** Animals co-owned with parents, the family farm or others are considered managerial. All registration certificates must be in the possession of the exhibitor. The original or breed association issued duplicate copy of registration are acceptable. Faxes from breed associations sent directly to State Fair will be accepted. Emails, photocopies or telephone calls from the breed associations will not be accepted.
- All calves and yearlings must be registered or transferred on/or before June 1st to be considered as ownership.
 - All animals that are two years or older must be registered only in the exhibitor's name on/or before January 1st of the Fair year.

Special Note: The Holstein Association USA is enforcing a new rule for sanctioned Junior Holstein shows. Transfer applications must be received by the Holstein Association by the January 1 and June 1 deadlines. Junior members will not be allowed to backdate transfers for ownership!

- 2) **Managerial:** Animals co-owned with parents, the family farm or others are considered managerial. An exhibitor is allowed multiple managerial agreements but is limited to exhibiting only one managerial animal in the Junior Dairy Department at the Wisconsin State Fair. Managerial dairy projects are only available in registered calf or yearling classes, **cows cannot be shown as managerial. Managerial project animals are not eligible to be exhibited in the open division during the current year's Fair.** Managerial forms are not required when the managerial animal is owned by the junior member's immediate family (brother, sister, parent or family farm). These family owned animals should be entered as managerial at the Fair but do not require the filing of a form. **Animals designated as county "Hardship" animals do not need to have a managerial form on file.**

For all other leased animals, a managerial form must be completed. Managerial animals need to be identified with the county agent on a Wisconsin State Fair Managerial Project Agreement Form (www.wistatefair.com) by June 2nd. The County Extension Office will also file a copy of the agreement (page 2) with the Wisconsin State Fair Agriculture Department, 640 S 84th St, West Allis, WI 53214 by June 5th. Managerial identification forms need not accompany the animal to the Fair but **MUST** be kept at the County Extension office until 30 days after the Fair.

- 3) Daily Care / Fitting: Junior exhibitors are required to care for and fit their own animals.
- Fitting and daily care of the exhibit is limited to the Exhibitor, his/her mother, father, sister, brother, stepparent or legal guardian (with proof of relationship) or other Wisconsin State Fair Junior Exhibitors.
 - Managerial animals cannot be fitted by the owner unless the owner meets the previously stated requirements. Violators of this rule will be removed from junior competition and/or may be removed from the Fairgrounds.
 - Designated fitting areas will be available. The fitting areas are an exhibit for the public to view. No smoking, alcohol or vulgar language will be allowed. All persons other than Exhibitors using the fitting area must register with the Fitting Superintendent prior to any fitting activities. Junior dairy exhibits are not allowed to leave the dairy exhibit or fitting areas. Persons abusing the fitting areas or violating the fitting rules will be removed.
- 4) Spectators shall not be permitted in the judging ring during the time a class is being judged.
- 5) Every exhibitor showing an animal should be dressed neatly and appropriately.
- 6) Each animal entered must be fed at the exhibitor's cost and at his/her risk. Feed and bedding may be purchased on the grounds but exhibitors are encouraged to bring their own.
- 7) Bedding: Exhibitors are allowed a maximum of 8 inches of straw pack. Large square bales are permitted but Wisconsin State Fair is not responsible or liable for movement or disposal.
- 8) Each county must designate leader(s) to be in charge of the exhibit and exhibitors. Each county's adult leader(s) is required to be in attendance at all times while their counties cattle exhibits are at the Fair. **For public safety and liability reasons county exhibits may not use space in or around their exhibits to conduct any type of direct contact/petting or photo opportunities geared toward fairgoers/public.** The barns will be regularly inspected and exhibits must be kept neat at all times.
- 9) No firm or farm name identification shall be carried, worn or displayed on exhibitor or animal while in the make up area or the show ring. Failure to comply with this regulation will permit the Superintendent to bar the exhibitor from showing until the regulation is complied with.

- 10) Junior dairy cattle (all breeds) must be registered with their respective breed association to be eligible to show. Further, junior dairy animals must meet national show (respective breed) eligibility requirements. To clarify the above rule – the grading-up process or registry status or degree of purity must be such that the animal is eligible to show at the breed's respective national show.
- 11) In cow classes, winners and others selected at random will be ultra sounded as directed by the Superintendent.
- 12) Wisconsin State Fair management reserves the right to interpret the rules and regulations and withhold premiums from those exhibits or exhibitors not following Wisconsin State Fair rules.

MILK HOUSE RULES AND REGULATIONS

The State Department of Agriculture and the Division of Food and Standards have recommended that a permit be required to deliver milk to the Wisconsin State Fair milk parlor. This permit can be obtained after your arrival. Farm names, complete address, number of cows and breeds are needed for a permit. Milk checks will be mailed out from Wisconsin State Fair by November 2009. **Wisconsin State Fair will retain 20% of all milk proceeds to help offset milk house operation expenses.**

It is necessary to continue the permit system and antibiotic preparation systematically, by udder infusion, orally, or any other method, prior to the Fair. Cattle, which have been treated, are required to be identified with red leg bands. Bands are available from the Milking Parlor staff.

We are pleased to have the Wisconsin Junior Dairyman members operate the Milk house. In addition to sanitizing equipment, they will take samples from each cow's milking to check for the presence of antibiotics. Each tank of milk leaving the Fair will be tested for antibiotic adulteration and all positive tests will result in the entire load being dumped. Exhibitors and/or counties contributing to the loss of a tank of milk will be assessed financial costs for any lost tanks. Each person milking must use a wash towel, stir cup, dry towel and teat dip for each animal. All will be provided.

Dairy plant sanitarians and health officials very carefully check for antibiotic adulteration in all milk. If a permit-holder or exhibitor is confirmed to have marketed adulterated milk in violation of State of Wisconsin Regulations or FDA statutes, that exhibitor will:

- 1) Automatically forfeit premium and milk sale monies for the current year. That money will be applied to the value of the bulk tank dumped milk or recalled product. The balance must be paid to the Wisconsin State Fair milk fund or legal action may be taken.
- 2) Failure to reimburse Wisconsin State Fair will also result in being barred from exhibiting and barred from participating in other dairy cattle show activities including judging. This will include members or partnerships.

THE PUREBRED DAIRY CATTLE ASSOCIATION SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS

Adopted April 3, 2005

Wisconsin State Fair endorses the PDCA rules with the exception of rule #2 in the "Grooming and Preparation" section. Wisconsin State Fair will allow no more than 2" of natural hair on the topline.

The showing of registered dairy cattle stimulates and sustains interest in the breeding registered dairy cattle. It is also an important part of the promotion, merchandising and breeding program of many breeders. For these reasons, the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association (PDCA) believes that it is in the best interest of all breeders of registered dairy cattle to maintain a reputation of integrity in dairy cattle shows and to present a wholesome and progressive image of dairy cattle in the show ring.

PDCA endorses this Show Ring Code of Ethics for all dairy breed shows and pledges its full cooperative support for its enforcement to show management, show judges, and the national breed associations.

The application of this Code of Ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this Code of Ethics. Dairy cattle exhibitors shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship.

It is recognized that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle that are necessary in the course of moving dairy cattle to and between shows that are advisable to keep them in a

sound, healthy state so they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal condition. At all times, exhibition livestock shall be treated in a humane manner and in accordance with dairy quality assurance practices so as to protect the health, safety and welfare of the livestock and the consuming public. No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he or she knows, or has reason to suspect, is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease, disease, or illegal or non-approved use of drugs, medication and/or prohibited substance, or residue.

The position of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association is all animals presented for exhibition shall be in their natural conformation and structure, free of any alteration or modification by injection or internal or external administration of any substance or by any involvement in unethical fitting.

GROOMING AND PREPARATION

Dairy cattle exhibitions are conducted under standards for evaluating conformation established by the PDCA Unified Score Card (1994), with specific breed characteristics taken into consideration by the show judge. In this connection, animals will be groomed and prepared for the judge's evaluation in order to display the animal's natural contour, conformation, performance and mobility.

Specifically:

- 1) External applications of cosmetics that affect only appearance may be used, including by way of example hoof polishes and false switches.
- 2) The maximum allowable length of naturally growing hair anywhere on the topline is not to exceed 1". Exhibitors will be required to comply with this rule before the animal is allowed to enter the ring.
- 3) Addition of foreign objects, including but not limited to hair or hair substitutes, cloth or fiber, to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body is prohibited.
- 4) Externally sealing the teat end with a preparation that does not harm the animal's skin is permissible. Natural teat placement will be given preference over artificially positioned teats.

VIOLATIONS: FALSE, DECEPTIVE OR UNACCEPTABLE PRACTICES

These practices are violations of the Code of Ethics and will be reported to show management and may be reported to the respective national breed associations:

- 1) Misrepresenting the age and/or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
- 2) Treating the animal, particularly the udder, internally or externally:
 - a. with an irritant or counter-irritant,
 - b. using a device to artificially create or enhance the udder crease,
 - c. using other substances as detected by testing that causes changes in the udder to artificially improve the conformation.
 - d. plugging of teat canal with foreign substances.
- 3) Surgical or unethical insertion of any matter under the skin or into body cavities, performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body (i.e., administration of fluid via a stomach tube or other similar apparatus to fill the rumen), though not to preclude practices required or involved in normal management.
- 4) Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring or other conduct detrimental to the breed or the show.
- 5) Challenging, threatening or interfering with an ethics committee appointed by show management to monitor the animals on exhibit on the show grounds.

EXHIBITOR RESPONSIBILITY

The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (hereinafter referred to as "Exhibitor") for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, milk, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Materials may also be collected by ultrasound and photographic methods and by direct examination of animal. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor") to have disciplinary action for violation of this Show Ring Code of Ethics taken by show management, the state in which the show occurs, and/or the national dairy breed association without recourse.

SHOW ETHICS COMMITTEE

Each show should have an Ethics Committee. The make-up of this committee should include official breed representatives, representative(s) of show management (e.g., dairy cattle show superintendent, General Manager), the official show veterinarian, and Extension representative.

The Ethics Committee will be responsible for monitoring violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. The Ethics Committee will investigate the report of any violation and determine the accuracy of the allegation. The Ethics Committee will have the authority to inspect animals and related material to determine if violations have occurred.

VIOLATIONS: REPORTING AND INVESTIGATION

Complaints of alleged violations can be reported to the show superintendent, show management, and/or the Ethics Committee.

Before An Animal is Shown

If the Ethics Committee suspects that a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics will occur if the animal is shown, and that violation is reasonably well established before the animal is shown, the Ethics Committee will submit a report to show management.

Show management will discuss the violation with the Exhibitor:

- 1) If, at the Exhibitor's discretion, the animal in question is not shown, no violation will have occurred.
- 2) If the Exhibitor wishes to challenge that a violation occurred, he/she/they will have opportunity to appeal to the Ethics Committee. If its decision is not changed, the Exhibitor will be denied opportunity to exhibit the animal in question.

During and After an Animal is Shown

All animals are subject to examination during judging. When a violation may have occurred, a milk out may be called for. This call may be by breed association rule, or by request of an authorized representative of the national breed association, the judge, the Ethics Committee, or show management.

If an animal is exhibited and a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics is subsequently suspected, investigated, and determined to have occurred, the violation will be reported to the Ethics Committee and show management for action. The Exhibitor will be notified of the violation and the supporting evidence and invited to defend or explain the allegations.

Violations are subject to the disciplinary provisions of show management, the state in which the show occurs, and the national dairy breed association. Sanctions may include any one, or combination of the following:

- Forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums or proceeds;
- Written letter of reprimand to the owner, exhibitor, fitter and/or absolutely responsible person (the "Exhibitor");
- Disqualification of the exhibition livestock from an exhibition;
- Disqualification of the Exhibitor from the show;
- Publication of offense.

Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for any number of years.

History: Adopted by PDCA in March 1969, revised March 1971, February 1977, February 1981, February 1986, February 1988, February 1989, February 1992, February 1993, November 1995, April 2003; April 2005.

WISCONSIN STATE FAIR ETHICS ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURES

- 1) An Ethics Committee, which will include an Ethics Coordinator, an Ethics Veterinarian and assistants, appointed by Wisconsin State Fair management, will be on duty at Wisconsin State Fair.
- 2) The Ethics Committee will be responsible for monitoring violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics by exhibitors and their representatives.
- 3) During this entire process, the identity of the animal, the owner and/or other involved parties will be kept confidential.

- 4) Complaints of alleged violations may be presented to the Dairy Cattle Show Superintendent, the Wisconsin State Fair staff and/or the Ethics Committee.
- 5) All complaints of alleged violations received by the above individuals will be presented to the Ethics Coordinator to determine investigative requirements.
- 6) All findings found by the Ethics Committee will be presented to the Ethics Coordinator.
- 7) The Ethics Committee will have the authority to inspect all animals to determine if violations of the Show Ring Code of Ethics have occurred. To help in this regard the Ethics Committee does have the authority to perform:
 - a) An ultrasound examination of the udder, prior to milk out
 - b) A milk out of any individual cow or cows and/or
 - c) The collection and testing of any of the animal's body fluids and/or,
 - d) The use of any other technology that may be useful in determining if a violation has occurred in any animal based on placement, random selection, or suspect characteristics.
 - e) The Ethics Committee may, at any time, require the delivery to them of any hypodermic syringe, needle, or other device, swabs, cloths, or other material, or samples or any medicine, preparation, or substance, whether in liquid or other form, in the possession or control of the exhibitor, his fitter, agents or persons acting on behalf of the exhibitor for the purpose of laboratory analysis.
- 8) If the Ethics Committee has found an individual who is not necessarily an owner or exhibitor committing in the act of committing a violation of the Code of Ethics, they will be subject to the same ethics enforcement procedures and possible sanctions as the owners or exhibitors.
- 9) If the Ethics Committee suspects that a major violation will occur if an animal is shown and that violation is determined before the animal is shown, the Ethics Coordinator along with the Dairy Cattle Show Superintendent and the Agriculture Director will determine if a major violation would occur if the animal was shown. The exhibitor will then be informed that the showing of that animal will result in a major violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics. If the exhibitor decides to not show that animal, no violation will have occurred.
- 10) Following the judging of the milking cow classes, the Ethics Committee will ultrasound the udders, prior to milk out, of at least the top one third of the milking cow classes with a maximum of ten head per class.
- 11) Following the judging of the milking cow classes, milk samples will be taken from a minimum of three cows in the open show – the Grand Champion, the Reserve Grand Champion and Honorable Mention – and one cow in the junior show – the Grand Champion, with the option of more at the Ethics Committee's request.
- 12) Following the judging of the classes and the evaluation of the ultrasound readings and upon the receipt of the milk sample analysis or other lab reports and reports of eye witnesses or Ethics Committee personnel, the Ethics Coordinator will submit a report to the Dairy Cattle Exhibitors Committee Superintendent and the Agriculture Director if any violations have occurred. This reporting will happen approximately 2 weeks after the end of the show.
- 13) The Agriculture Director will then immediately notify the accused individuals that a major violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics has occurred and all of the supporting evidence will be shared confidentially with the exhibitor. Approximately two weeks later an ethics hearing will be scheduled.
- 14) The Ethics Coordinator and the Dairy Cattle Show Superintendent will then present the evidence while maintaining individual confidentiality at a hearing of the Ethics Subcommittee of the Dairy Cattle Exhibitors Committee. This hearing will be presided over by the Chair of the Ethics Committee. The Exhibitor will be invited to defend or explain the allegations and/or have representation at the meeting. The Ethics subcommittee consists of seven people: six dairy committee members and/or parents, including at least one representative from each breed if possible, and one member of the Wisconsin State Fair Park Agriculture Committee. They will serve as the jury to determine if violations have occurred and suggest what punishments are appropriate for this offense. The guilty verdict must be by a 2/3 majority of the Subcommittee. All actions will be reported to the Wisconsin State Fair Park Agriculture Committee and Wisconsin State Fair Park Board.
- 15) The General Manager will then immediately inform guilty individuals of the actions of the Ethics Subcommittee hearing. The guilty individuals will then have ten days to appeal the verdict allowing for error correcting only and not a re-hearing to the Wisconsin State Fair Agriculture Committee, consisting

of 5 directors including one officer who will serve as chair. No Board member may serve on both Ethics committees. After ten days the Board of Director's Ethics Review Committee will determine the final verdict. The final verdict will be reported to the Dairy Cattle Exhibitors Committee and the Board of Directors.

- 16) If found guilty of a major violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics, the individual, representative and/or animal will be barred from participating at Wisconsin State Fair for a minimum of one year and up to three years. The identity of the animal(s), exhibitors and/or representatives who are barred will be kept confidential.
- 17) An animal found in violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics will not receive any class or futurity premiums from Wisconsin State Fair.
- 18) The individual, the exhibitor, their representatives and/or the animal guilty of repeating a major violation could be barred from participating at Wisconsin State Fair for life.
- 19) Barring an exhibitor or representative and/or an individual will result in animals owned fully or in partnership by that individual, farm and/or affiliated entity not being allowed to enter or exhibit in Wisconsin State Fair shows. That individual will also be ineligible to serve on an official committee, as an official judge and/or other official capacity for three years.
- 20) If a serious violation has occurred, the Ethics Coordinator will report this to the Dairy Show Superintendent who will report this violation to the judge for their action in the placing of the class. In addition, if the judge finds a serious violation, they should also utilize this in their placing of the class.
- 21) In addition, the Ethics Coordinator will report the serious violation to the Agriculture Director, who will issue a letter of severe reprimand to the exhibitor. Repeated violations could be sent to the Dairy Show Ethics subcommittee for further disciplinary action.
- 22) If a minor violation has occurred, the exhibitor will be notified and asked to refrain from such behavior. The Ethics Coordinator will inform the Dairy Show Superintendent, who can inform the judge of the minor violation or the judge can also determine if a minor violation has occurred in the show ring and use these findings in the placing of the class. The minor violation will be reported to the Dairy Cattle Show Superintendent and the Agriculture Director and a letter of reprimand will be issued to the exhibitor.
- 23) The Official Judge or Ethics Committee can also order milk out for the entire show or for individual classes or animals. When a milk out is ordered for the entire show all group classes must be milked out. After the animals have been milked out, they will be shown again and the judge may alter the placing accordingly.
- 24) Any serious or major violations uncovered during or after the milk out will follow the same procedures as described above.

JUDGING PROCEDURE

- 1) A group placing system will be used. No more than 3 animals may be placed in any one of the first 3 groups in classes of 12 animals or less. In classes of over 12 animals not over 30% of the total number of animals exhibited in the class may be placed in any one of the first three groups. All fractions are dropped. When less than the maximum numbers of animals are placed in the first group they may be placed in any of the 3 remaining groups. When less than the maximum number of animals are placed in the second group they may be placed in either of the remaining groups, and when less than the maximum number of animals are placed in the 3rd group they are to be placed in the 4th group.
- 3) Classes will be judged on the basis of the breed characteristics. Animals not worthy of premiums may be disqualified by the Superintendent or Judge.
- 4) Classes of cattle that have over 60 entries may be divided according to age. Class breaks will be designated after entries have been received.
- 5) The "Dry Cow" Classes refers to any cow that was last fresh 280 days or more prior to the day of the show. The animal may be shown at the option of the exhibitor in either the Dry or Milking Cow lot. To exercise this option the cow must be entered in the milking cow class. **No switching will be allowed from a dry cow class to a milking cow class unless the cow is recently fresh.** A cow milked less than 280 days must show in the milking class, unless she is recorded dry on the official computer report. This sheet must accompany animals to be shown in the Dry Cow Classes.

- 2) Exhibitors must exhibit his/her own animal entered and checked in for one of the breed classes. The same animal must be used in all heats and finals. Youth exhibiting county "Hardship" animals are not eligible to participate in showmanship.
- 3) Fitting is optional. Milking females do not need to be "bagged" for competition. Extra credit will not be given for those who are.
- 4) Exhibitors' age as of January 1st will be used for determining age division. The Superintendent will post class order at the Fair.
- 5) The Superintendent reserves the right to break any class with more than 10 participants into heats. Exhibitors will be randomly assigned to heats. The judge will select the top showpersons in each heat (quantity at the judge's discretion) to advance to the final class for that particular age class.
- 6) Premiums for the finals will be paid on straight placing. Participants not selected to advance from preliminary heats will receive a \$5.00 premium.
- 7) Exhibitors are encouraged to wear a Wisconsin State Fair sponsored showmanship shirt if available.
